

CLAA Artists' and Writers' Summit and Workshop: Cultivating Compassion for Migrants through Fine Arts and Prose November 9-10, 2021

Workshop Focus:

This series of lectures and roundtables seeks to help in developing a community sense of place among young artists and writers and address issues related to discourses on the borderlands. Our focus in is to give border residents a voice to share their experiences about immigration through storytelling, art, and other creative works. While the political maelstrom of the immigration emergency is complex and often difficult to navigate, writers and artists encourage us to write about and express these important aspects of the immigration experience that is so important in our community. This workshop seeks to encourage participants, who are inspired to share and support the narratives of immigrants and the plight of their families, to explore the themes of this event and create artistic media and written expressions.

This workshop will foster public conversations and raise awareness about the ongoing immigration dilemmas happening in the Rio Grande Valley and other borders. The project will support both experienced and aspiring writers and artists by fostering relationships through public lectures, roundtable, and exhibition events.

This writers' and artists' workshop will provide a venue for participants wishing to cultivate peace, awareness, and understanding through the written word and artistic media. The ethical directive delivered to the writers, artists, and audiences will be through the words of our keynote speakers, <u>Sister Norma Pimentel</u> and <u>Luis Alberto Urrea</u>, who will participate in the workshop. Writers <u>Cecilia Ballí</u>, <u>Melissa Guerra</u>, <u>César L. De León</u>, and <u>Christopher Carmona</u> will also participate to discuss the writer's process and share their knowledge of stories about the border to support the stories of immigrants and refugees in Texas and the southern borderlands through narrative, oral history, and other interpretive storytelling and creative methods. Collaborations with our invited speakers and our colleagues at UTRGV will provide unique learning activities for our students and our community, which is a key priority of the mission of the Center for Latin American Arts.

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Artist <u>Rigoberto A. González</u>, who has won a Migration Narratives grant through the Institute of Diversity and Civic Life, is collaborating artist <u>Luis Corpus</u>, Chair of the Department of Art at South Texas College, and artist <u>Olga Alanis</u>, art instructor at South Texas College. These artists will be participating in a small exhibition at the CLAA space, and González will be giving a lecture at the roundtable events on November 10th. Artist Olga Alanis, who is a UTRGV MFA alumna and currently an art instructor at South Texas College, is one of González's former students and collaborators. She will be participating with Luis Corpus and Rigoberto A. González in the artists' workshop with students from both UTRGV and STC. All interested participants in our community are invited to attend.

<u>Tuesday, November 9</u> Writer's Roundtable, "El Primero Paso:" Crafting Your Writer's Process 11:00am - 1:30pm

Author, poet, and finalist for the Pulitzer Prize, Luis Alberto Urrea, will join four writers of fiction, nonfiction, and poetry to discuss the different aspects of the writer's craft, including what inspires their writing, their writing process, and what it is like to work within their genre. 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They will consider how immigration and the border have shaped their lives, their work, and their identities. All students who are writers, or considering a life of writing, are encouraged to attend.

Speakers will share for 10-15 minutes about their personal approach to writing, developing an argument and a point of view, and other topics relevant to writing effectively. The prompts for writing will connect with the theme of the roundtable and event.

Audience engagement will include panelists crafting a prompt to reveal to the participants. Our audiences will be encouraged to write a poem or a text up to 500 words in response to the prompt, and there will be time to allow the participants to post their work in a forum connected to the CLAA. Feedback from participants and panelists can later be posted. Submitting to the forum will be active until Nov 12 with feedback posted through Nov 19. All panelists for the November 10th event will be invited to comment.

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Tuesday, November 9 2:00 PM - 3:00 PM Artists' Workshop: Painting with Cochineal Red

Join artists Luis Corpus, Olga Alanis, and Rigoberto A. González to create artworks using these materials from cochineal in a workshop that shares stories and speaks metaphorically about the urgent crisis on the border.

Painting Workshop

Cochineal is a red dye consisting of the dried, pulverized bodies of certain insects, *Dactylopius coccus* of the Coccidae family, which are cactus-eating cochineal insects native to tropical and subtropical America. Cochineal is used to produce scarlet, crimson, orange, and other colors, and it is also incorporated to prepare pigments such as lake and carmine. The dye was introduced into Europe from México, where it had been used long before the arrival of the Spanish. Cochineal is found in South Texas and is native to this area.

Activities

Participants will explore the process of extracting a variety of red dyes from cochineal, paint with cochineal on paper, and create a collaborative group artwork created by all.
