

She works a teaching artist in the Austin community with a focus on the pedagogy of equity in creative writing. She is the Regional Program Manager for Austin Bat Cave and is the director of Barrio Writers, a free college level youth writers workshop founded by author and activist Sarah Rafael Garcia. Leticia's creative work appears in PANK, Chicon Street Poets, Lumina and many others. Her book, *Las Criaturas*, explores the intersections of Latinx identity with folklore, stories and the supernatural or speculative.

Dr. José A. Rodríguez is a memorist, poet, translator, and professor with UTRGV. He's a member of the Texas Institute of Letters, Macondo Writers' Workshop, and CantoMundo. His most recent publications include his book of poetry, *This American Autopsy: Poems* and work within the new anthology *Nepantla Familias*.

Student, Faculty, and Alumni Updates

Julieta Corpus (MFA, 2016) has her debut poetry collection, *Of Love and Departures/De Amor y Despedidas (2021)*. She also translates literature, including the short story collection "Flesh to Bone" by ire'ne lara silva, which garnered Corpus a Tasajillo Writer's Residency.

César L. de León (MFA, 2018) was awarded the Texas Institute of Letters' John A. Robertson Award for Best First Book of Poetry for his 2021 debut poetry collection, *speaking with grackles by soapberry trees*. His book was also recently awarded the 2022 best book of poetry by the Philosophical Society of Texas. de León is currently a lecturer in the Department of Literatures & Cultural Studies and, in his position, also teaches for LCS in Brownsville and at the UTRGV Collegiate High School in Harlingen.

Daniel García Ordaz (MFA, 2017) has been named McAllen's 2023 Poet Laureate.

Rodney Gomez (MFA, 2009), who was in the initial MFA cohort, was awarded a Creative Writing Fellowship with the National Endowment for the Arts. Gomez also won awards or was a finalist in several book awards, including the Helen C. Smith Memorial Award for Best Book of Poetry (2021), for his publication *Arsenal with Praise Song*. Gomez also established the Bougainvillea Prize at FlowerSong Press, which supports a working class writer's full-length collection.

Noreen Graf (current MFA student) had two literary comics accepted in *MER*: *Motherhood Literature & Art* and six poems accepted in *Sixfold*.

jo reyes-boitel's (current MFA student) book, Michael + Josephine, was chosen as part of Albuquerque's National Hispanic Cultural Center's monthly book club and will be discussed in May.

Dr. José A. Rodríguez (current MFA faculty) had his poem "Tender" appear in The New Yorker.

J. Villanueva's (current MFA student) debut chapbook, *Roadside Fruteria*, was published by Bullshit Lit.
