- a) **Modification to Degree Audits** Presentation on the implementation of Modification to the Degree Audit process versus curriculum/catalog changes.
 - i) Why are there so many discrepancies? During the transition to UTRGV, the institution didn't have enough time to merge curriculum at the level we look at it now. Many degree plans were done on paper it was much easier to be flexible with degree plans. And during that time, we did not have any restrictions on what was covered by financial aid. Will this process happen during a specific time or is it on going? It is ongoing through data attained by substitution patterns or through the department/program. - b) Course substitutions discussion on impact to academic/program integrity.
- c) **Discontinuing programs** discussion on impact on the application cycle.
 - i) What is the ideal lead time for discontinuing a program or modality change? It's best to get them in early in the fall. This is due to the level of background work that is needed to develop the admission process, impact to current students, impact of admission to the program/modality if a student has applied and been accepted during a term that the program may have wanted to close.
- d) **Open applications with no program implementation** if no intent to offer or if program is contingent on cohort size, then the program should be discontinued either permanently or temporarily with a request to reactivate at a later date.
