FESTIBA 2023 explored the theme "Transforming Our World Through Arts and Literacy" to celebrate the transformative power of the arts to touch and move the emotions, and to engage in the arts as a great source of inspiration to bring people together and transform communities. The imagery of FESTIBA 2022-2023 included the Monarch Butterfly, considered to be the most beautiful of all butterflies in the world, representing strength, endurance, spirituality, trust, transformation and evolution. FESTIBA 2023 aspired to be such a transformative event with the hope of uplifting, uniting and inspiring the entire Valley community through cultural arts events.

FESTIBA 2023 was a bold and broad event designed to showcase our UTRGV students and faculty to the community, and to bring outstanding artists, musicians, authors, poets, other creatives and experts in their fields to UTRGV. It was a unique festival that brought national and international talent in a variety of music, art and literary fields to the RGV, to inspire our students and engage our community.

- National and international guests included over 40 authors, artists, nationally renowned artists, scholars, and community leaders
- Thousands of books were distributed to over 3,000 children at six public schools in Edinburg, Hidalgo, Mission, Alamo, and Weslaco as part of the Texas Book Festival *Reading Rock Stars program*.
- 600 students competed in the FESTIBA Mariachi Workshop, Group and Vocal Competition, and Grand Concert. Students participated from all over Texas. The event includes recruitment information describing music programs and process to apply.
- Close to 1,000 attended the FESTIBA 2023 Grand Concert and over 1,500 attended the FESTIBA 2023 Mariachi Group and Vocal Competitions
- Over 2,000 community members participated in the Community Festival at the Dustin M. Sekula Memorial Library in Edinburg and over 1,000 free books were distributed.

REVIEW OF CREATIVE WRITING EVENTS BY EMMY PEREZ:

Monday:

Andrea Sanderson workshop - we had about 12-15 students attending in-person and via Zoom. Students wrote works in response to the prompts shared by Sanderson and all of them shared them out loud. They wrote some amazing work. One student in Mexican American Studies and mariachi (Jennifer) also sang a song at the end of the workshop. She said she hadn't written poetry before or thought to incorporate singing and spoken word as Andrea does. She came to the next day's events too. This event was co-sponsored by Department of Creative Writing, FESTIBA, and Gallery Magazine

Tuesday:

Gris's Muñoz's plática - we had about 35 people joining in person and via Zoom. It was a dynamic event, where Muñoz provided her testimonio about becoming a writer in El Paso where she was born and raised and shared one of her short stories. Students were eager to get books signed by her and ask questions. In talking to some a few days later, many said how excited they were by her talk, and how inspired they were to tell more of their own stories. This event was sponsored by the department of Creative Writing with funds from my Dr. Robert S. Nelsen Professorship in Mexican American Studies

Andrea Vocab Sanderson's and Gris Muñoz's performances. We had about 45 people in attendance. It was a beautiful event. Andrea had a guitarist accompany her in her performance which was a combination of song and spoken word poetry. Muñoz performed her poetry and is a powerful performer as well. The two complimented one another and the whole audience was engaged from beginning to end, asking great questions as well. Many clamored to speak to them at the end, taking pictures with them and asking them to sign books (I ordered their books from the bookstore which were sold on site). Students raved about their events in the days afterwards, saying how inspired they were by it all. I have some recordings of their performances.

Myriam Gurba and David Bowles (private) Zoom with students. We had about 12 folks show up for this private Zoom with students. It was a fantastic discussion where Gurba and Bowles talked about publishing and the Dignidad Literaria movement they are part of to raise awareness with big publishing houses in NYC to publish more writers of color.

Myriam Gurba's reading and presentation Webinar was amazing! She is a brilliant, humorous, and profound writer and speaker. She shared excerpts from her creative nonfiction work *MEAN* and she discussed her latest book which is forthcoming in Fall 2023. She answered all the questions asked with insight and grace. We faculty asked our graduate teaching assistant Jo

Reyes-Boitel to moderate and she did great! I don't have the list yet of attendees via Webinar but it may have been around 40 from what I recall seeing. We recorded the event.

Thomas Ray Garcia and Robert Moreira - I was unable to attend this event, but I hear that it went great! The two fiction writers shared their work and engaged in discussion about writing and more. Sponsored by the Department of Creative Writing

REVIEW BY DR. ELVIA ARDALANI:

First of all I wanted to thank you for Festiba, your project is so wonderful for the university and beyond. Jornadas Literarias *Libro Abierto*: Mujeres y Escritura, was a success. We had 8 speakers (counting me), from Spain, Mexico, Puerto Rico and the US. Out of those 8 speakers, 6 were writers and 3 were academics (from National Autonomous University of Mexico, UNAM and University of Puerto Rico). Every session was attended by students, exstudents, coleagues, our community and some viewers from Spain, Mexico and Italy. Southeastern Louisiana University, through Dr. Rodrigo Pereyra, helped out in the organization of the events. Every speaker had a strong curriculum, but the 3 most well known were Carmen Posadas, Silvia Molina and Alicia Giménez Bartlett (I am including a brief bio of each one of them, in case you need that info). We also had a writer from the border, Elpidia Garcia, from Ciudad Juarez (a fiction writer), and María José Mielgo Busturia, a writer and editor from Bilbao, Spain. In my session we presented my new novel, *Pelo de Gato* and I talked to students of Creative Writing.



EARTHCLOUDS





Artist's Statement

Art has always been a phenomenon of allusion through illusion. The *Earthcloud* series talks about that. I have built a visual dialogue with illusion alluding to the projected endgame of mass production. It is ironic that it has resulted in actual objects. *Earthclouds* are rags that because of excessive mass production and waste have attained quantum consciousness. Everything is energy, and with enough complex mass, can have a quantum

consciousness. I saw the enormous piles of fabrics at the Ropas as potentially having this quality, which allowed my rags to rise from the piles of discard into a separate dimension. My photographs show them seeking primordial organization where only newly conscious, man-made, entities exist.

JUAN DE DIOS MORA, GUEST ARTIST



Juan de Dios Mora has lived in border towns where different cultures clash and yet expressions and emotions coalesce. However here in the US, it's traditions, racism, and stereotypes have introduced him to the reality of being an immigrant in a different country.

Mora blends his hybrid Mexican culture and American experiences into a single entity and focuses on the economic, social, and cultural issues of life on the border. Mora portrays characters interacting with customized devices and vehicles that are created to facilitate the daily life, duties, responsibilities, obligations, and entertaining events of the operators.

Working representationally and sometimes with the surreal, he portray images of the typical Mexican/American's life, iconography, and beliefs. His objective is to bring people together, with sentimental, satirical, sarcastic, and comical themes. He hopes to evoke self-awareness and then to

superimpose that awareness on the experiences of life.



"Circa is a project that aims to keep memories alive through collage. A photo, a scene expresses an endless number of possibilities, a continuous presentation of stories, which can be reassembled, re-narrated, and consequently can remain current. Circa is a word that comes up recurrently in any archival search, demonstrating that our findings, although imprecise but true, are only the surface of a reality, a reality so complex that we can generally only reach it superficially through conjecture. In this project/experiment the old scenarios are mutilated, distorted, and intervened to open a dialectic between the figurative and the abstract, the narrative and the formal."

from the University of Buenos Aires, Argentina, in 2006. While she attended the University, she took classes in several art workshops taught by masters such as Lautaro Fiszman, Aníbal Cedrón, and Carlos Terribili. ZARA GONZALEZ HOANG



ZARA GONZÁLEZ HOANG is a picture book author and illustrator. She grew up in a little bungalow in the frozen tundra of Minnesota. Surrounded by snow she spent her days dreaming, doodling and listening to the colorful stories of her Dad's life growing up in Puerto Rico while trying to figure out where she fit in as a mixed-race Latina Jew in a sea of Scandinavians. These days, she lives outside of DC in a magical suburban forest with her Mad Man husband, human-shaped demons and curly-coated corgi. She still spends her days dreaming and doodling, but now instead of listening to stories, she's starting to tell some of her own.

ANA SIQUEIRA



Ana Siqueira is from Rio, Brasil, where she is an award-winning published author. In 1992, she moved to the United States where she teaches Spanish to elementary children. She has published a Spanish book for the educational market, *El Pato Quiere Uvas*, published by Teacher's Discovery. Ana is also an Abuela and she loves playing with her grandkids, reading, writing, and cooking. She has never learned how to bake...yet. She lives in Florida with her husband and with her college-aged son. She has four kids and five grandkids. Her favorite things in life are family, books, and chocolate. Her debut book, *Bella's Recipe for Success*, tells the story of a Latina bilingual girl who tries to learn how to bake with Abuela and discovers the value of making mistakes and trying again. Publication by Beaming Books is planned for Spring 2021.

KARLA VALENTI



Karla Valenti is the author of the bestselling and highly-acclaimed middle grade novel, *LOTERIA*, as well as various picture books, chapter books, and middle grade novels. Her storytelling is seeded in Mexican culture and mythology, and heavily influenced by the cultural profile of the many countries where I have put down roots throughout my life, including France, Japan, Germany, and the United States.

Her stories are often explorations of various philosophical and identity-based themes (inspiring the mind) while also taking readers on riveting magical realist adventures (inspiring the heart). She currently lives in the Chicagoland area with her husband, three kids, and two very lazy cats.

CARMEN TAFOLLA



Loved throughout the world for her moving performances and poetry readings, Dr. Carmen Tafolla is a poet, storyteller, performance artist, motivational speaker, and university professor.

The author of more than 30 books, her work appears internationally in high school and university textbooks, newspapers, journals and magazines, and elementary school readers. Named State Poet Laureate of Texas in 2015, she is currently the President of the Texas Institute of Letters. Tafolla had also served from 2012-2014 as the first City Poet Laureate of San Antonio and presented at more than 300 schools, universities, professional conferences, and community arts centers in her two-year tenure. Called by Roots author Alex Haley a "world-class writer", Tafolla has received numerous awards, including the prestigious Americas Award, presented to her at the

Library of Congress in 2010, five International Latino Book Awards, two Tomas Rivera Book Awards, three ALA Notable Books, a Charlotte Zolotow Award, the Art of Peace Award, Top Ten Books for Babies, and has been recognized by the National Association of Chicana and Chicano Studies for work which "gives voice to the peoples and cultures of this land."

MARCELO VERDAD



Marcelo Verdad is an author and illustrator from México who likes to tell stories from unconventional perspectives. He graduated from ArtCenter College of Design, where he came upon the Children's Book Illustration class and immediately fell in love with kids' books. He is a member of SCBWI and was one of the recipients of the Mentorship Award at SCBWI's 2019 Summer Conference. *The Worst Teddy Ever* is his picture book debut. He lives in Los Angeles, California.

XAVIER GARZA



Xavier Garza was born in Rio Grande City in Texas's Lower Rio Grande Valley in 1968. Growing up along the border in a Mexican-American family, he became intensely interested in both the spooky local folklore and the sport of lucha libre or Mexican wrestling. After receiving his BFA in art from the University of Texas Pan American in 1994, he became an art teacher. During the late 1990s and early 2000s, he began to exhibit his work in venues such as Talento Bilingue de Houston, Guadalupe Cultural Arts Center in San Antonio, Nuestra Palabra de Houston and various Mexican Consulates in the Rio Grande Valley and El Paso. Garza's art has also been displayed in The Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio, Mexic-Arte in Austin, Gallista Gallery in San Antonio, Coronado Studios in Austin, and The Ice House in Dallas, among many others. After contributing to several anthologies in the early 2000s, Garza penned and illustrated his first children's book, Creepy Creatures and other Cucuys, which was published

by <u>Arte Público Press</u> in 2004. Over the next decade, he went on to craft many other award-winning titles. His stories have also appeared in many periodicals, including *El Mañana, The Monitor, TABE, The Corpus Christi Caller Times, Mesquite Review* and the *Milwaukee Spanish Journal*. In 2007, Xavier Garza received his MA in Art History and Criticism from the University of Texas at San Antonio. He presently resides in that city with his wife and son.



ROBERT SATTERLEE, PIANIST





She is also the co-founder of the digital map and storytelling project, GeoTestimonios Transfronterizxs, which aims to record the experiences of women living on the El Paso/Juarez border. Muñoz is Xicana of Apache descent. This visit is made possible by UTRGV's Dr. Robert S. Nelsen Professorship in Mexican American Studies.

ANDREA SANDERSON



Andrea Sanderson. San Antonio Poet Laureate 2020-2023, performs as "Vocab" in her hometown San Antonio. "Watching her perform, the word 'hero' comes to mind. And not 'hero' for the sake of just skill, but for her work in her community: Sanderson teaches poetry workshops, mentors, builds up and encourages artists to pursue their art, and gives them platforms to showcase their talent. Sanderson's interest in other people's art and artistic development became a passion of hers, and she started curating her own shows and creating platforms for other artists to hone their craft by hosting open mics." (From The San Antonio Current, Jan. 16, 2018.)

Her poetry is published in, *The Texas Observer*, *Pariah Anthology* SFA Press, and *Sycorax's Daughters*, and other publications. Her debut book entitled: *She Lives In Music*, published

on FlowerSong Press, was released on Valentine's Day 2020. Her album *She Tastes Like Music*, is available on all music streaming platforms.

VISITING AUTHORS FROM JORNADAS LITERARIAS LIBRRO ABIETO: MUJERES Y EXCRITURA, DEPARTMENT OF SPANISH

Carmen Posadas was born in Montevideo, Uruguay and lived there until she was 12 years old. In 1965 she moved to Madrid with her family. She has also lived in Moscow, Buenos Aires and London. She is the author of more than 15 children's books as well as five novels, two biographies, and several film and television scripts. In 1998 she won the Planeta Prize, her work has been translated into 30 languages and in 2003 Newsweek magazine named her one of the most relevant authors of her generation.

Silvia Molina is a Mexican author, playwright, editor, and essayist. She has written numerous novels, including *La mañana debe seguir gris*, which won a Xavier Villaurrutia Award in 1977, and *El amor que me juraste*, which earned a Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz Prize in 1998. She has written 10 novels, 6 short-story collections, and 32 children's books. She is a member of the Mexican Academy of Language.

Alicia Giménez Bartlett is a Spanish writer particularly known for her series of detective novels with protagonist Petra Delicado. The Petra Delicado novels have been published in various languages and are very popular in Germany and Italy. In 1999 Petra Delicado appeared as the protagonist of a television series. Four of her novels have been used for an Italian TV four-part series: *Petra*, first broadcast in September 2020.^[2] In 2011 Bartlett won the Nadal Prize for *Donde nadie te encuentre*. She has written more than 22 novels and has been translated to several languages.

Dr. Diana Seitz, Associate Professor of strings and violin at the UTRGV School of Music, College of Fine Arts, is recognized nationally and internationally as a pedagogue, soloist, chamber, and orchestral musician.

Josué "Eddy" López, professional mariachi performer and arranger, Director of Grand Prairie Fine Arts Academy's high school mariachi program.

Dr. Adolfo Estrada, professional mariachi performer and guitarist, Assistant Professor in the School of Music and Director of Latin Music Studies at Texas State University.

FALL FESTIBA

FESTIBA 2022-2023 included a new element - *FALL FESTIBA* - which took place November 7th – 11th. This event featured two outstanding women: **Ada Limón, poet and Aída Cuevas**, Mexican singer and a visit by 600 students from Vanguard Fine Arts Schools.

Ada Limón became the 24th Poet Laureate of the United States in July of 2022. Limón is the author of the poetry collections *The Hurting Kind* (2022, Milkweed Editions); *The Carrying* (2018, Milkweed Editions), which won the National Book Critics Circle Award for Poetry; *Bright Dead Things* (2015, Milkweed Editions), a finalist for the National Book Award, the National Books Critics Circle Award, and the Kingsley Tufts Poetry Award; *Sharks in the Rivers* (2010, Milkweed Editions); *Lucky Wreck* (2005, Autumn House Press, reissued 2021); and *This Big Fake World* (2005, Pearl Editions).

Limón earned an MFA from New York University and is the recipient of fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the New York Foundation for the Arts, the Provincetown Fine Arts Work Center, and the Kentucky Foundation for Women. Her work has appeared in numerous publications including the *New Yorker*, *Harvard Review*,

Pleiades, and *Barrow Street*. The College of Fine Arts Creative Writing Program will present Ada Limon (virtually) on November 9th at noon at the Student Union Theater, Edinburg campus.

Aída Cuevas, dubbed as "The Queen of Mariachi," is an esteemed figure in Mexico, beloved for her unswerving devotion to traditional mariachi music and for her mastery of its demanding vocal forms. Aída Cuevas, with a 45-year career and 41 album releases to her credit, represents one of the most important careers in traditional Mexican music with Grammy and Latin Grammy Awards, and eleven nominations, becoming the first female singer in the mariachi genre to ever win these awards. FALL FESTIBA presented her concert: *45th Anniversary – Yo Creo Que Es Tiempo*, an unforgettable and emotional concert celebrating a long-lasting career as Mexico's most important female voice. She was joined by renowned UTRGV Mariachi Aztlán. Concerts took place on November 9th in Brownsville, TSC PAC (7:30 pm), and in Edinburg, UTRGV PAC (7:30pm). The concerts were very well attended, and the Edinburg event was sold out.

The Creative Writing Program presented the event with Aida Limon, in collaboration with the Center for Mexican American Studies, Center for Bilingual Studies, and other campus departments (see poster) and included Texas Poet Laureate – Lupe Mendez. The presentations were very well attended by University students.

Vanguard Schools visited the campus and enjoyed presentations from local author, Katelyn Renteria, artist Jessica Monroe, and a concert by the Ballet Folklórico UTRGV and Mariachi Juvenil Aztlán.
