Course Description:

The students in this course will have the opportunity to study the detailed structure and function of the renal/urinary system.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- The student will achieve an understanding of the structure and function of the renal/urinary system.
- The student will describe mechanisms involved in altered fluid, electrolyte, and acid-base balance.
- The student will comprehend relevant examples of human health and diseases in the areas of the renal system:
- Fluid /Electrolyte and Acid/Base Balance be able to identify and describe the physiology of the homeostatic mechanisms that control fluid electrolyte and acid/base balance.
- This section of the course includes: identification and description of the major fluid compartments, including intracellular, extracellular, intravascular, and interstitial (including volume and chemical composition of these fluids.
