Capstone Experience:

The Capstone Experience is comprised of 3 parts:

- 1. Statement of Philosophy and Praxis
- A. The philosophy will draw upon and synthesize several secondary sources from coursework and independent research to articulate a coherent MAS philosophy.
- B. The statement of praxis will discuss how the student will concretely put into practice his/her/their philosophy in their profession and beyond, which may include personal life, activism, etc.
- 2. Revision of Seminar Paper and Reflection Paper
- A. Student will choose one paper to significantly revise from a previous course. Revisions will be determined with the Chair of the Capstone Experience Committee, and may include deeper engagement with secondary sources, additional research, and additional elaboration of examples.
- B. Student will compose a short reflection paper (3 to 5 pages double-spaced) that explains why student made specific revisions and how those revisions have reshaped their seminar paper.
- 3. Oral Examination
- A. The oral examination will be conducted by the Capstone Experience Committee. Questions will be based on the student's Statement of Philosophy and Praxis as well as the revised seminar paper and reflection paper.

FOR NEWLY ADMITTED STUDENTS

- Getting registered: All new students must contact the Graduate Coordinator, Dr. Cathryn Merla-Watson (cathryn.merlawatson@utrgv.edu) prior to registering for classes.
- First-time advising may be accomplished prior to the start of the first semester in person or via Zoom. All students must discuss course schedules with their academic advisors in order to register for classes. During this session, a Degree Plan will be generated for the student. The student will choose will track they will take: Thesis or non-Thesis Track and also choose the two other disciplines they wish to take.
- Full-time status for students is 9 hours a semester. Part-time is 6 hours or less.

FOR STUDENTS INTERESTED IN GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS

- Students interested in graduate assistantships must be enrolled full-time. [9 hours a semester Fall/Spring, 3 hours in Summer]
 - There are two types of assistantships offered:
- Research Assistantship-this is an assistantship where a student is assigned to a faculty member to assistant in the research that the faculty member is working on. The duties of the assistantship is restricted to the research that the faculty member is working and is not a personal assistant for the faculty member.
- Teaching Assistantship-this is assistantship where a student is assigned to teach an introductory level course [MASC 2301]. In order to teach, a student must have 18 hours of MASC courses in order to teach.

TRANSFER CREDITS

- When admitted, a student may request transfer credits for courses taken at another university. The Graduate Office of Admissions evaluates transfer hours. These are usually all graduate courses elected in the past 7 years for which a passing grade has been reported.
- The department conducts its own subsequent review and allows for transfer credit courses and hours congruent with the student's Degree Plan. The maximum number of hours that may be accepted for a MA student is 9 hours.
- Students may request assessment when their Degree Plan is formulated; they should write to the Director of Graduate Studies requesting assessment.

- Transfer courses should be clearly indicated on the plan of study, with a description of a course's relevance where its title may be uninformative, or for independent study. The Program reserves the right to request further information from the applicant about a course.
- Transfer credits should not dominate a field; normally it should not have more than 6 semester hours.
- Students may NOT use transfer credits to fulfill the Program's course requirement for MASC 6300: Research Methods in Mexican American Studies.

ADVISING

1st Year Students: Students should individually consult with graduate advisors on a regular basis (i.e. every semester) – not just to pre-register – but also to communicate regularly about progress toward the degree and one's professional development. Students are free to change their degree plans at any time, but must first consult with graduate advisor prior to making this choice.

2nd Year Students: revisit Degree Plans in the Fall semester of their second year. 2nd year students should arrange to consult with their advisors regarding the Plan of Study in the first weeks of Fall semester. By this time all transfer credits and changes to Degree Plans should be finalized.

- #1 Signed and typed up Program Degree Plan required to start thesis hours to the Graduate Coordinator who forwards. As you wind down coursework and look towards a thesis, get ready for this step.
- #2 Contact and secure a Thesis Committee Chair. The Chair will have a thesis I MASC 7310 opened under their name, if they are available for your request. Please remind them to have a spot for you opened. The same process will happen for Thesis II MASC 7311.
- #3 Signed Graduate Office Application for Graduation to Grad Coordinator (the dates below indicate that this is done well before the semester of graduation.)

If committee membership changes, there is additional paperwork available at Grad College Website. You need at least three members on your committee. While at least one member of the three-person committee will be core MAS faculty, affiliate members from other departments are eligible to serve as well other faculty who will help you make your best thesis project and manuscript.
 - #5 Draft of Thesis uploaded with Grad College System.
- #6 Certification of Completion signed by committee members. Please bring the form to your thesis defense: committee membership and other text on the form typed.
- #7 Final Draft of Thesis with Grad College and Certification form turned in.
