
According to the Center for Disease Control

- ▶ Approximately 12 million people 40 years and over in the United States have vision impairment, including:
- ▶ 1 million who are blind
- ▶ 3 million who have vision impairment after correction
- ▶ 8 million who have vision impairment due to uncorrected refractive error.
- ► Many causes of blindness occur without symptoms

Leading causes of vision loss in US

- ▶ Primarily age-related eye diseases
- ▶ Age-related macular degeneration: Most common cause of blindness and vision impairment in Americans aged 60 and older.
- ► Cataracts: (leading cause of blindness in the world)
- ▶ **Diabetic retinopathy:** Leading cause of blindness in the US. Affects more than 5.3 million Americans ages 18 and older
- ▶ Glaucoma: 2.2 million Americans have been diagnosed with glaucoma, and another two million do not know they have it

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The Annual Eye Examination

- ►Annual eye exams create a history of a person's eye health while offering preventative eye care.
- ▶ Update Glasses and contact lens prescriptions.
- ▶Well women's exam during pregnancy
- ▶Detect eye diseases such as glaucoma and macular degeneration
- ▶Rule out eye diseases caused by DM, HTN and high-risk medication use
- ▶In children will determine if glasses or contacts needed and if a child may be susceptible to any types of eye diseases.
- ▶Myopia management in children



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Recommended examination frequency for the adult patient

- ▶ From ages 18 64, Eye exams are recommended every 2 years UNLESS they are considered AT RISK then at least annual exam is recommended
- ► From ages 65 and older, eye exams are recommended every year



Should I see my eye doctor?

- ▶ Eye Injury
 - ► NOTE: Always wear Eye Protection over your eyeglasses or contact lenses!
- ▶ Vision changes
 - ▶ Flashes or Floaters
 - ▶ Missing sections of vision
 - ▶ Blurriness- Difficulty driving, reading up close
- Ocular health changes
 - ▶ Bumps, irritation, eye pain, injury, redness, swelling, loss of lashes

Components of a comprehensive eye exam


- · Patient Visual, medical and family history
- Visual acuity and keratometry (curve of cornea)
- Pupil function
- Eye muscle movements and confrontation fields
- · Refraction (lens power for refractive error)
- Intraocular pressure
- Anterior segment evaluation (front of eye)
- · Posterior segment evaluation (back of eye)
- · Ancillary Testing based on findings



Adult patients at risk include:

- A personal or family history of ocular disease.
- Belonging to certain racial and ethnic groups.
- Systemic health conditions with potential ocular manifestations. (DM, HTN, auto-immune disorders, multiple sclerosis, cancer, and many others)
- Taking prescription drugs with ocular side effects (High risk medications)
- Functional vision in only one eye.
- Wearing contact lenses.
- Eye surgery or previous eye injury.
- High or progressive refractive error.
- Patients who have undergone refractive surgery (LASIK, PRK, SMILE) should still have an eye exam every 1-2 years for monitoring health.



09:24:52 I've been around for 24 years in practice. I've worked at all sorts of, clinics and I am therapeutically licensed in Optometry and I am an optometric glaucoma specialist.

09:24:57 I am open to any questions if you'd like to interrupt us during our presentation. You're welcome.

09:25:06 Could you give us an idea of how many minutes we have to present?

09:25:14 But good 1520 min. Yeah.

09:25:16 Okay, thank you. And my name is Lorena Flores Fernandez so like Dr.

09:25:24 Floyd is I'm where our passion is optometry, I'm an off the metric.

09:25:29 L'Il come a specialized as well, therapeutic optometry for over 18 years, private practice and of course the university.

09:25:35 So today we're talking about ocular health and and the importance of your annual eye examination. It's safe your vision month.

09:25:43 Just a little bit of information here according to the CDC. They're about approximately 12 million people over the age of 40 that have some type of vision impairment okay that would mean about a million of them who are blind 3 million who have some type of impairment even with glasses on but the bottom portion shows you that there are 8 million people who have some type of vision change.

09:26:07 Due to uncorrected refractive error, which means that there's 8 million people walking around who haven't updated their glasses.

09:26:11 Yes.

09:26:13 And cannot see well because they have maybe not had a chance to get an eye exam. Some of this blindness will occur without symptoms, which is why we're here today to kind of let you know.

09:26:25 What we have to offer is stressing the importance of ocular health.

09:26:29 So some leading causes of vision loss in the US, a lot of this is going to be maturity related, but you've got macular generation, you've got cataracts.

09:26:39 Diabetic rinopathy, of course, a leading positive blindness in the US. That's more than 5.3 million people over the age of 18.

09:26:47 Glaucoma. Glaucoma has no symptoms so many of our patients coming through might have some type of vision.

09:26:58 So looking into Save your Vision Month, the annual lie exam, of course it's really important.

09:27:04 Sometimes there's confusion on you know, what do we need an exam for? Of course, it's creates your history.

09:27:11 We want to update those glasses, right? To make sure that we see well and do all our jobs, you know, as efficiently as wonderfully as possible.

09:27:17 We were talking about what women exams during pregnancy. It helps us detect eye disease and rule out disease that happens with really common systemic illnesses like diabetes and high blood pressure or even high risk medications like people who take medicines for a rheumatoid arthritis or people with history of breast cancer that have, long-term medication use and of course in children right to see okay the

09:27:44 earlier onset of prescriptions we want to make sure that our kids see well and clearly so that they're active and happy and do well in school.



09:27:50 And of myopia management should be prescriptions that are high in children of near sightedness that we can help control to keep them from going up over time.

09:28:00 So just kind of an overview recommendations for an eye exam. If you're over 18 and 64, of course, geared more to adults.

09:28:08 We'll recommend an item at least every 2 years unless you have some type of risk factor, then that's every year.

09:28:14 And then for those over 65 it is the annual exam that's a recommendation. So if you want to know, well, how do I know what other things we do?

09:28:24 We see, of course, for glasses and contacts. But eye injuries, right? Always wear your eye protection.

09:28:30 If you have flashes or floaters, missing sections of vision, blurriness, difficulty, get bumps on the lid, redness swelling.

09:28:37 Allergy season here is really prominent. So we treat all those things and those are things that we'd want to.

09:28:44 We are welcome for you to come in so that we can help you. If I may interject.

09:28:50 You don't really need to have glasses to come and visit us. Sometimes we have family health because of genetics that we should be looking into things like retinitis pigmentosa, it's rare but it does happen. It's rare but it does happen.

09:29:09 Things like color blindness. What other? I mean, there's a lot of, disorders that can happen or that are undiagnosed and that we have a high risk because we're more prevalent genetically so just a well well visit would be a good idea to come in even though you don't need glasses you see well.



09:29:28 And of course when you come in, some people will ask, what part of your eye exam? We'll check your vision.

09:29:35 We'll go through your medical history. Well, take a look at your pupils, how they react because the eye is connected of course to the other areas of the brain.

09:29:42 Your muscle movements, your pressure, you look at the front surface, the back surface, and in some cases that determines you need additional testing.

09:29:50 We can do all testing for Glaucoma, Mac, the generation. We've got great technology at the Vision Center, fund this photos, pictures that we can show you with the back of your eye looks like to also keep in your documentation for your exam.

09:30:05 So looking back at at risk factors like we were talking about anybody with a history of eye diseases, certain ethnic groups have higher risk.

09:30:15 If you take medicine for blood pressure, hypertension, multiple sclerosis. If you take medicine, for things that, you know, like autoimmune disorders in cancer.

09:30:28 We're matured arthritis as well. Do you wear contacts? Have you had Lasik or vision type of a refractive surgy?

09:30:34 A lot of patients think, well, I've had my surgery of Had Lasik, I'm, 2,000, and, 20, but the back of your eye, you're in your sight, it still stays a near shaded eye.

09:30:41 So we want to take a look what's happening on the inside as time goes by as of course we mature.

09:30:46 Of course, if you've had injuries in the past where you have a really high prescription, we also want to look to make sure that the health of the back BI is staying normal.

09:30:56 So just a quick peek at what we look at every day. And everyone's ever, if anyone's never not seen what the inside of the eye looks like.

09:31:03 This is our favorite, you know, stuff. It's the optic nerve. It's the blood vessels.

09:31:09 Cause that's what we're looking at. Is there diabetic or blood pressure things? The nerve is their glaucoma, center part macular that happens with maturity changes.

09:31:17 So this is some type of tech. This is some type of photos we can take to show you, at your exam.

09:31:25 And just, we thought we throw in a few examples of things that we don't. Prefer to see on a routine exam, but things that when we do see them can lead to devastating vision loss that we want to take care of. So you've got right.

09:31:38 Mulled detachments where you see the bleeding on that upper left side. You have macular degeneration which will have little calcium deposit suit in maturity over time.

09:31:49 Bottom left time corner that's glaucoma where the nerve has kind of got larger and it degenerates, leads to side vision loss.

09:31:56 You have diabetic right now, see what will happen to diabetes if it's not controlled.

09:32:01 And then cataracts on that lower right side, which is what happens with maturity to all of us, especially when we live in an area that has lot of like the valley or trauma or trauma.

09:32:14 So some of the things we treat, we thought we put some in there. I know it's a long list that's available at our website, right?

09:32:22 Vision Center. But, we look at the I exam from the but from the front to the back.

09:32:31 You know swelling of the lids pink eyes eye injuries and again gesture annual exam which is really important to help us look for identifying factors.

09:32:42 Sometimes you might have headaches as well. You might be seeing perfectly fine, but you're getting headaches.

09:32:48 Oftentimes your primary care physician will say, you know what, first line is go get an eye exam.

09:32:55 So that something to consider as well.

09:32:59 So we fit glasses in contact lenses. So for anybody who's wondering contact ones fittings for a variety of brands, we do soft lenses, disposable dailies, monthly, by weeklies, multifocals.

09:33:12 We do do specialty fittings with hard gas permeable lenses, which are GP lenses.

09:33:17 And scalar lenses which are kind of more in large hard lines for a lot of mnial disorders.

09:33:23 We do offer the mice at myopia management for anyone who has children who are nearsighted and wants to control the prescription from, increasing over time.

09:33:33 Now regarding the my site load and that you did say that anytime a patient has maybe just the slightest amount of hyperopia or far sightedness or a little bit of near sightedness or almost at 0.

09:33:48 Would you say as they grow they're at risk of near sightedness? Yes. So then as a parent you might want to consider for long-term prevention of near sightedness for long term prevention of near sightedness to consider coming in to visit, your children.

09:34:02 They may be a candidate for my site, Myopia management. Yes. On that in for glasses, if you decide, you know, you prefer to go with a prescription set of new glasses or optical offers a variety of frames.

09:37:10 Well, I would like to just say when you're diabetic. You primarily want to maintain a good lifestyle, healthy lifestyle that clean diet, stay away from processed foods and sugars, etc.

09:37:30 Not just a screening. The exam is everything. We check the front, the back of the eye, we check your refraction.

09:37:38 Now sometimes diabetes is out of control. We hope that nobody has out of control blood sugar. Because of diabetes.



09:37:49 Sometimes they want you to be seen every 3 months. Sometimes every 3 to 6 months, it just depends on you.

09:37:56 As the pageant, okay, so we check individually and we work closely with your primary care physician as well as an endocrinologist.

09:38:09 Okay, so we check individually and we work closely with your primary care physician as well as an endocrinologist if you have one if you Well, do you want to add something?

09:38:10 I think that's answered very well. Thank you. Many of us work long hours on our computer.

09:38:16 What's the recommendation for taking care of our vision? Do you have anything? So normally on computers, if you have these Dell, which most of us do write university, these Dale computers.

09:38:30 There's a little screen icon on the right hand side. If you click on it, you'll see a night light option.

09:38:33 You want to put the nightline on. That's your blue filter, right? It's going to turn a little yellow.

09:38:38 But your blue filters help absorb some of that blue light that's emitted from, LED sources that can lead to insomnia can lead to computer fatigue syndrome and migrant.

09:38:50 Migraine, headaches, eye pain. You do, we recommend what we call the 2,02020 rule after 20 min of looking at screen time.

09:38:56 Look away 20 feet 20 s. You want to look away to blink. It'll refresh your tier film but it also kind of keeps you know your muscles from feeling like they're not having to over compromise vision.

09:39:11 Okay, and if you look at blue filters. Every device has them. If you have Android, it's a little easier.

09:39:18 You go under studies, probably blue filter or your yellow display. Apple is gonna be like your night shift, which is gonna be your warmth.

09:39:25 And if you're, it, that's it, right, huh? Okay. Some of you are not sure where the clinic is.

09:39:35 I believe our address is 38 0 4 South Jackson and we are in the multi-specialty clinic we're in suite number 4 yeah We can't be missed.

09:39:44 Well, behind what is it, the movie Beastro? It's a little ways down on Jackson.

09:39:53 We're in between Wisconsin and Trenton, okay? But, you give us a call and we'll get you here.

09:39:56 No worries. Are there any other options? Yes.

09:40:00 Okay.

09:40:01 Contact information again. What about that?

09:40:04 They had a question on, this individual had has hypertension. They're managing it with their meds.

09:40:12 What can, what can hypertension cause with their eyes?

09:40:16 So hypertensive retinopathy, you don't want it to get, you don't want the hypertension to get out of hand, right?

09:40:23 Okay.

09:40:27 Okay.

09:40:24 Because when you do, it does affect our circulation all throughout your body. And because the eye is.

09:40:30 Has such micro vessels. That's the first place that the high blood pressure will affect.

09:40:37 So you should be managing your high blood pressure, take your medication as prescribed by your biomedical doctor come in to have annual eye exams at least.

09:40:50 And just add that you can get bleeding at the back of the eyes. You can have inflammation in the retinal layers, the cell layers from the bleeding and you can even have strokes of your minor vessels or your major vessels like your vein and artery.

09:41:04 And that would, that can lead to these times permanent vision laws. So definitely want to take care of that hypertension.

09:41:10 And follow up with your doctor, but again, make sure we're having that annual exam.
